'Cleanliness is next to Godliness' was a Victorian belief. In 1851, the census shows that Paxton House had 22 indoor servants - excluding the butler & outdoor servants!

These servants looked after the resident Foreman Home family of 5 adults and 6 children! Your visit

will be guided by our education staff who will be dressed in period costume, and we recommend that the children also visit in similar costume to instantly create a sense of the period. We have a selection of costumes available.



Slavery

Take a tour of our new exhibition, interpret archive materials and considering how life has changed in our local area as a result. A possible two part session both in school and at Paxton House.

Objectives:


- · Interpret historical evidence to help to build a picture of Scotland's heritage.

Second World War

Find out what it was like to live in the Borders during the war.

Make your own ID card. Find out about ration books and food and clothing. Try on a replica gas mask. Hunt for the ius bomb in the grounds. Learn war





Servants

Take a tour of the house and gallery to see the contrast between our beautiful state rooms and the dark kitchen. Experience life as a Victorian servant through a range of activities including floor scrubbing, laundry and pot cleaning

Objectives:

- · Experience life as a servant during Victorian times
- · Communicate what it was like for a servant through role-play and discussion.

· Learn about objects from the Victorian kitchen.

School

Step back in time to experience an immersive and drama-based workshop. Our strict Victorian mistress will instruct her pupils in the 3Rs and physical drills. Pupils will have an authentic visiting experience where they will have the opportunity to use slates, slate pencils and copybooks.

Objectives:

- · Compare the experiences of Victorian and modern school.
- Communicate their understanding of Victorian school through role-play and discussion.
- · Learn about the uses of Victorian objects found in school.

Toys & Games

Learn about the past by playing with Paxton House's collection replica Victorian toys. Find out about the trends and influences on toys in the Victorian era and which toys you would play with depending on whether you were born into a working, middle or upper class family.

Objectives:

- To investigate and compare toys from the past with some of the toys they are familiar with today.
- · To make their own toy from the past.

Victorian Christmas

Explore the traditions and customs of a Victorian Christmas through a series of interactive role play activities in our Victorian style decorated house. Step back in time to learn all about the origins of Christmas traditions. Following a tour make some Victorian inspired crafts to take home. There is also the opportunity to meet Father Christmas with a difference!



Art Tours

Themed tours looking at different types of art work in Paxton House.

After studying the portraits throughout the house use our replica costumes to pose for and then paint your own portrait.

Objectives:

- · To look at different artistic styles.
- To have a go at drawing and painting their own portrait usin different media.

Writing Workshop

Whether your children are confident writers or struggle to get their ideas down on the page, Paxton House has something for everyone. Our relaxed workshops inspire young writers to think creatively and develop their writing skills though hands on experiences. Use the house and grounds to have fun and be inspired.

Objectives:

- Within a motivating and challenging environment, develop an awareness of the relevance of different experiences and texts.
- · Use a range of strategies and resources to develop writing skills.
 - · Use first hand resources to aid understanding of different life experiences.

Fairy tales & other stories

Support your children's study of stories with a visit. Investigate a story, participate in some related arts and crafts before participating in our new trail.



Pond Dipping and Bug Hunting

Use a net and learn how to dip in the education pond or explore the undergrowth. Then take a closer look to see what you have found, using (age appropriate) identification charts. All equipment is provided.

Objectives:

- Investigate the woodland and pond through minibeast hunting, pond dipping and games, using simple equipment.
- Identifying and classifying (using keys, ID worksheets to identify minibeasts).
